IF THERE IS A MILD JANUARY spell and you happen to be out and about, keep an ear cocked for the powerful song of the mistle thrush.

He can be heard almost anywhere, including large city parks. Wherever you come across him,

he will almost certainly be perched on the highest branch of a tall tree, shouting out his song of rich, fluted, short phrases, each one a little different from the previous one. (To the birders amongst you – I often think that there are chunks of song included that are very similar to that of the golden oriole).

His song can carry for a very long way on the wind, although sometimes he appears to suddenly turn the volume down, fooling you that in fact he is much further away than he is. He also has the habit of singing very loudly at the height of a powerful gale, earning him the popular country name of the 'Storm Cock'.

The obvious bird that you might confuse the mistle thrush with, is its close cousin the song thrush. However, the mistle thrush is altogether a more powerful, larger-looking bird, with a

plump breast covered in brown spots which go all the way down the front of the bird to its flanks. The song thrush on the other hand, is quite a slim-looking bird, whose spots turn to streaks as they descend down the front of the bird.

In flight, the mistle thrush appears to

have relatively long wings and its tail shows a whitish edge as it flies. It also holds its wings tightly shut against its body for a couple of seconds inbetween a number of wing beats, so creating a very undulating flight.

It is a bird that has a
wonderfully loud rattling
alarm call, not unlike an oldfashioned football rattle. Any
gamekeeper worth his or her
salt, will immediately know that an

unwelcome predator is in the vicinity, as mistle thrushes don't use their alarm calls without good reason, unlike blackbirds!!

Indeed, should this call be heard from February onwards when nesting starts, woe betide any predator which comes too close to the nest site, as they will receive the full ferocity of the angry mistle thrush pair. They appear to be completely

fearless in defence of their nest, attacking and actually hitting crows, magpies and even foxes.

My parents once had a pair of mistle thrushes nesting in a conifer tree in their garden, which was also a favourite tree for their labrador to sit under. During the nesting season, the poor dog had to choose somewhere else to relax, as the pair of irate birds would attack him relentlessly until he reluctantly moved, tail between his legs, to another more restful place.

During the first part of winter, quite often a mistle thrush will 'take over' a berry-laden shrub or crab apple tree laden with fruit, and fiercely set about all other 'intruders' who might want to share in the larder. This is known as 'resource guarding' and ensures that the bird has a constant food source through the winter. Research has shown that





these birds may well nest a little earlier and have a slightly larger clutch size than birds

who do not adopt this protective behaviour, but instead travel around looking for food.

Around 1800, the mistle thrush was only found in the southern parts of the UK, but then in a period of just 50 years, they suddenly spread to the rest of the UK which they still inhabit to this day. Why this happened, nobody seem quite certain!

Finally, why is the mistle thrush so called? Well, back

in 1661, when the first attempt to come up with a comprehensive list of all British birds was made, this bird was then known as the mistletoe thrush, because it has a particular liking for mistletoe berries. The scientific name Turdus viscivorus literally means the thrush that devours mistletoe!

It may well be that the mistletoe plant is relatively dependent on this bird to spread

its sticky seed around, either by wiping the seed onto a new twig or by swallowing the

berry and later pooing it out onto a branch. The very fact that the seed has travelled through the bird's gut, will help to vernalise the seed, making it more likely to germinate once it has been deposited.


I am writing about the Mistle thrush for January's species of the month because I heard one singing this morning on the outskirts of Barford St. Martin – and it

is only the 4th of December! So, listen out for their powerful song as they should be well practised by the time you read this! — **PT**


Ella Wheeler Wilcox (1850–1919) was an American poet and author, celebrated for her accessible and inspirational verses. Born in Johnstown, Wisconsin, she showed a love for writing from a young age and began publishing poetry as a teenager. Her most famous work, Poems of Passion (1883), gained widespread popularity despite initial controversy over its themes of love and sensuality.

Wilcox's poetry often embraced themes of optimism, personal empowerment, and spiritual reflection, exemplified by her famous lines, "Laugh, and the world laughs with you; weep, and you weep alone." She was also a proponent of spiritualism and mysticism, reflecting her belief in the afterlife.

In addition to poetry, Wilcox wrote essays and selfhelp articles, gaining a reputation as a champion of positive thinking. She died in 1919, in Connecticut, leaving behind a legacy of uplifting literary contributions.




Welcome to Bookworm Corner!


The Butchering Art by Lindsey Fitzharris ISBN 978-0-141-98338-7

We are Bellingcat by Eliot Higgins ISBN 978-1-5266-1571-8







New Stars Appeal cots bring comfort to mums and babies at Salisbury Hospital



Babies born at Salisbury District Hospital are sleeping even more comfortably thanks to the arrival of 20 specialist cots funded by generous donations to the Stars Appeal.

The new cots, which cost a total of £38,000, are helping the 2,200 babies born at the Hospital each year as well as making things easier for their mums. They are height adjustable and have drop-down panels, so mums are able to sleep right by their baby's side in comfort.

First-time mum Lizzie Johnson and her baby Noah have benefited from the new cots. She said: "The cots are brilliant as they turn into a 'next to you' crib. This was fantastic especially when I was finding it painful to bend and I couldn't lift Noah out of the cot. It meant I could sleep by his side and keep him settled through the night."

Mum Charlotte Harryman also praised the specialist cots for making her time in hospital

with her baby Matilda a more comfortable experience. She added: "It was lovely to be closer to Matilda and not have to stare at her through a plastic screen. It also felt safer to co-sleep with her and getting her in and out of the cot was so much easier. The cot made it more comfortable to be with my baby. Matilda loved being in the new cot."

Maternity Matron Becky Roberts added: "We want to thank the wonderful Stars Appeal supporters for their generosity, which is providing babies and



their families with the best equipment possible for their care and comfort. These new cots give mums the chance to sleep side-by-side with their babies, which enables greater bonding in the first few hours and days of life. They can feel closer to their babies even when they are unable to get out of bed. We look forward to seeing even more babies who are born in Salisbury resting well in enhanced comfort."

Many of the cots were funded by individual donors, who gave £1,900, and were given the opportunity to have their cot named in recognition of their support.


Jan Sanders and her family were one of the generous donors who funded a cot. It was a cause close to their hearts, as Jan explains: "It means such a lot to me and us as a family to fund one of these cots. We have a very close connection to the Maternity Unit. I had my two sons at Salisbury Hospital, my granddaughter, who was born premature at 26 weeks, was cared for on the Neonatal Unit, and I trained and worked as a midwife here. The cots are super, lots of mums are going to

benefit and their babies will be so much more comfortable."

Jan, who was a midwife on the Hospital's Maternity Unit for 30 years, recently visited the Postnatal Ward with her husband Bill to see the cot named after her family in recognition of their support.

The Greek philosopher Heraclitus is credited with the words 'the only constant in life is change'.

As I look back over 2024 the word that sums it up for me is Change.

At the end of 2023 we bid farewell to Revd. Graham Southgate who moved over to the benefice of Upper Stour with Maiden Bradley, and then Revd Juliette Hulme retired at the end of October.

Alongside all this, discussions began over the re-organisation of the benefice (the group of churches that make up the Nadder Valley Churches). Change is close at hand.

For many, change can be difficult. It can leave us with a sense of loss or insecurity while for others it opens up fresh opportunities.

As I write this, storm Darragh has been doing its worst in our villages. Storms seem to be more frequent and I wonder how many more we will have gone through before you read this?

These days we often get advance warning of approaching storms and we can take these warnings seriously and plan for it or we can ignore the warning and at best hope it will pass us by. Either way the storm is certain. Of course there are other times when severe weather takes us, and the meteorologists, by surprise. Storms always leave their mark and driving around our villages over the past 24 hours shows so much evidence of this. Our landscape has been slightly changed as trees have fallen, electricity been temporarily lost, some have experienced flooding and many have had their plans disrupted. Others have been left feeling anxious and unsettled.

Change can be like this. When we know that is it inevitable we can prepare for it. But then there are times when we get no warning and can be left floundering. Either way when we can embrace change, being open to new ideas and perspectives, we become more resilient and better able to face any future change.

When faced with change I find it helpful to remember the words of a song I used to sing in Sunday School 'Yesterday today forever, Jesus is the same, all may change but Jesus never'.

So perhaps the Greek philosopher Heraclitus didn't get it quite right.


